(W1) Supporting Youth with FASD at Risk or Already Involved in the Youth Criminal Justice System: What Parents, Guardians and other Caregivers Need to Know

This workshop is intended to provide parents and caregivers with an orientation to the youth criminal process. Discussion will include how children living with FASD are at risk in the youth criminal legal system, and what parents and caregivers need to know so as to better understand and support their children throughout this process. Topics will include vulnerabilities as accused and/or as victims/complainants; safeguarding children's legal rights as accused; detention and arrest; release; trial; and sentencing. There will be an emphasis upon the significance of FASD at each stage of the process.

(W2) The Use of Film to Document an Australian Aboriginal Community's Response to Alcohol Use and FASD

This session will feature two films produced by Associate Professor Jane Latimer and Ms Melanie Hogan and made in the remote communities of Fitzroy Valley, in the Kimberley region of north-west Western Australia. Yajilarra (26 mins) tells the story of how local women (Ms June Oscar and Ms Emily Carter) led the battle to have restrictions imposed on the take-away (carry-out) of full strength alcohol and identifies the health, education and social benefits this had in these communities. This powerful film has been lauded at United Nations at forums for Indigenous peoples and for the Status of Women. It demonstrates that knowledge gives power to individuals to make major changes in our society. The alcohol restrictions gave the community time to address the legacy of alcohol abuse, including prevention and diagnosis and FASD, as highlighted in the second film, Marulu (6 mins).

(W3) Another Response to Prevalence Studies: How Should Teachers be Prepared to Teach Students with FASD?

The revised prevalence figures first presented by May and Gossage in 2009 indicate that between 2 and 5% of the student population of North America fall within the fetal alcohol spectrum. Given the complex learning needs of students with FASD, it is startling to compare the amount and level of material available to teachers of this disorder with that of other learning exceptionalities.

Since the 1990s a comparatively small number of educational resources for teachers of students with FASD have been published by advocacy groups, ministries and departments of education, and the FASD Centre of SAMHSA. To date, those documents remain the primary resources for most teachers and others in North American educational systems who wish to learn more about supporting students with FASD. Textbooks on inclusive education make minimal reference to the condition. A review of teacher education programs and graduate certification in special or inclusive education indicates that university level courses on FASD and education are extremely rare. Many teachers report that inservice sessions about FASD are uneven in quality and of limited utility in the classroom.

The assumption of this presentation is as follows: We think we know what the problem is, but it has not been investigated in any depth. Until we have a thorough grasp of the scope of the problem, we cannot develop an effective way of addressing it. This is the rationale for assessing the learning and behavioural difficulties of a student with FASD and it should be the rationale for an in-depth investigation of teacher education, with the intent of effecting change. In this session, I will present an overview of how teachers learn about FASD at present, and of potential opportunities to enable teachers and other education professionals to become better informed about FASD.
